#### Annual Fall Foliage -Watkins Glen & PA Grand Canyon by Joe & Linda Zimliki

his year we will be zoomin to Watkins Glen on some great Miata roads with spectacular scenery. When you say Watkins Glen, you immediately think of the International Race Track and wineries. You will drive your MX-5 on the 3.4 mile Grand Prix storied road course for 2 laps behind a pace car. After the 2 laps, you'll stop at the Start/Finish Line for a photo. Not only will you drive the speedway track, but you'll also drive the original street race course used 1948 - 1952.

You will be able to visit the many different wineries in the Finger Lake region and visit the beautiful Watkins Glen State Park. Within two miles, the glen's stream descends 400 feet past its breathtaking gorge with 200-foot cliffs, generating 19 waterfalls along its course. The gorge path winds over and under waterfalls and through the spray of Cavern Cascade.

On the way home Sunday, we'llvisit the PA Grand Canyon. In 1968, the National Park Service designated 12 miles as a National Natural Landmark. The gorge is 47 miles long with its southern tip 1450 ft deep. Two parks have views of the gorge, and the best time to visit is autumn for the foliage. Following the Grand Canyon visit, we will continue home by way of more great Miata roads.

I have invited the Trillium Club to join us. We'll have a limit of 14 cars from our club. Once you have made the list for the cruise, I will send you hotel information so you can make your reservation. Reservations have to be made by September 11.

e took off on winding and hilly roads to the music of locusts. Our first mystery destination was Yarnick's Farm. This unique farm grows vegetables in a greenhouse, in fields, and hydroponically. Our first stop was Yarnick's grass parking lot beside a picturesque farm scene complete with farm workers in the huge fields and farm buildings along the edge. We were able to choose meats, vegetables, plants, baked goods, jellies and much more, including apple dumplings and purple tomatoes, in their Farmer's Market. Barely out of the grass parking lot and just down the road, we went through Thomas' Covered Bridge, single file, of course, while a local driver waited patiently for 14 Miatas to pass through. Next we traveled to Smicksburg, sharing the roads with the Amish and their buggies. There was an availability for fresh fertilizer along the way. While some sampled the wines at the Smicksburg Amish Country Winery, others browsed through lovely antiques, crafts and handmade furniture. We also were able to buy Amish-grown June strawberries.

We then traveled lovely roads lined with trees or views of farms, along with the ever-present buzzing locusts, wondering what the next mystery destination would be. We headed northeast. Eventually we arrived at Doolittle's Station. This was the dream of a local dentist. The profits go to his foundation which supports cleft palate treatments for children in Honduras. We entered The Depot which was built from original blueprints of the 1890's B& O railroad station. We boarded a 1949 Pullman dinning car which was converted to a 1950's diner car. We had great imaginative lunches including the option of a BB3, Doolittle's competition burger. There, Linda gave us history on the many railcars on site. We visited the 1913 Parlor car which was connected to the depot. It was one of only four built. It had cuban mahogany, stain glass, and elaborate inlays. The Little Caring Caboose was where Autistic children could go out to dinner with their family. A 1901 Pullman car now used for B & B, is palace on rails,

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and was used by Theodore Roosevelt for his Presidential campaign and the President of the Railroad. Pizza Car is from a South Side restaurant. Brew Works boxcar is a nano microbrewery where they make their own. Baggage car displays 9 miniature railroads and even had a miniature red Miata. It is maintained by the Dubois area model railroading community. The variety of rail cars were arranged to surround a miniature golf course.

Of course, we ended with ice cream, a short walk around the corner on the Doolittle grounds. After Penn State Creamery Death By Chocolate or other homemade on-site Doolittle ice creams, we wound our way back home. It was a good time, a long day, and about 200 miles of great, varied Miata tree lined roads through woods, villages, farm fields, and beautiful Pennsylvania scenery.

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
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
